THE WAR MEMORIAL.

It was felt that the Association War Memorial should be in a form which would be of lasting benefit to the school. Accordingly it was decided that it should consist of a bookcase filled with reference books on general subjects.

The bookcase has been so designed that the names of those whom we are commemorating are recorded on a parchment scroll, protected by a glass frame, on the top of the bookcase. Each book itself contains a suitable bookplate.

In a central position below the 1914/18 War Memorial in the Creighton Hall a new plaque has been placed. On this is the following wording.

IN MEMORIAM.

Old Boys who lost their lives in the 1939/45 War are commemorated by a Bookcase and Books presented to the School Library by the Old Boys' Association, Parents and Friends.

To the right of this another plaque, presented to the School by the Staff. This reads

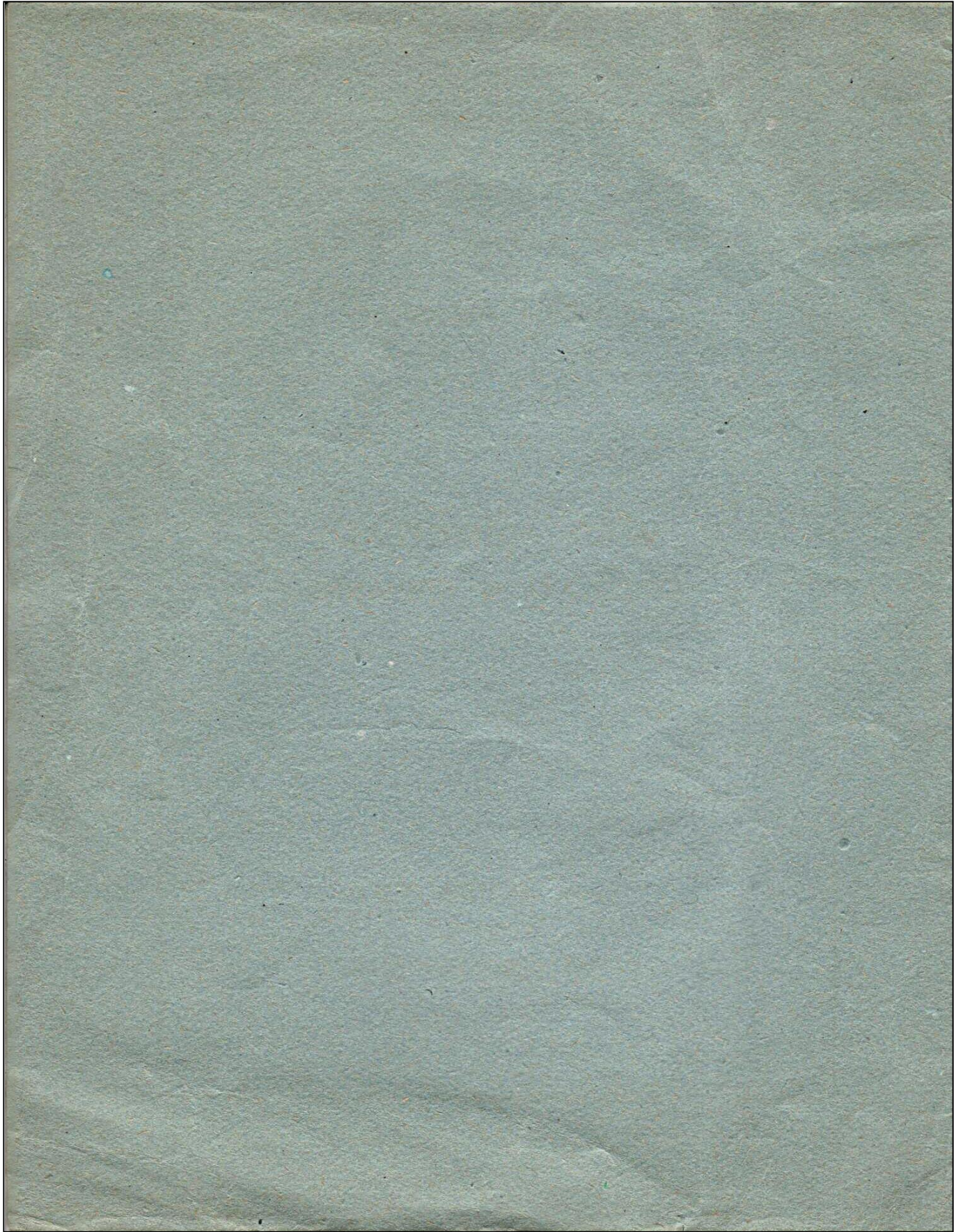
