The Club Service (Sec. Richard Baker).

The club centres round a moral Ideal of Fellowship and the religious service is the very core of the society.

Sept. 14th. Dealing with his theme from a rather personal point of view, Mr. Phodes recalled the origin and growth of Youth House, and reminded us all of the ideals and hopes with which Mr. Woodman had inspired the Club.

Sept. 21st. In the morning Mr. Woodman gave us an amusing account of the hardships of a trainee on board the "Royal Arthur" (Butlin's Holiday Camp), of the unreality of the Camp religious service, but of the splendid fellowship on board.

In the evening he took us on an imaginary journey round Youth House showing us how the selfish would treat the Club and obtain pleasure; but how the Christian would secure real enjoyment.

Sept. 28th. Mr. Webb spoke to us on the secret of "Triumphant Living", and the power of intensive prayer at all times. (Service conducted by Eunice Cridland). Oct. 5th. Employing the simile of "the wireless set" Miss Prentice revealed in a delightful way the secret of finding God, finding oneself in harmony with Him, and then listening-in to Him. Oct. 12th. Mr. Richardson dealt with the origin of the Y M.C.A. and remarked in his speech: "I've watched Youth House develop and I feel confident that it will spread and leave its mark forever."

Oct. 19th. The Society Room was packed to overflowing with Youth House - London and Northampton. The service was conducted by Ken Seal. Mr. Rhodes recalled with amusing reminiscences the happy times at K.G.S. That happiness had been intensified in Youth House which was now a home for us all. We sang with Youth
