Welcome to St Anne with Holy Trinity Brondesbury. It is lovely to have you with us on this great occasion as we give thanks for the Centenary of Kilburn Grammar School Old Boys Association

St Anne's is the Church of England parish in Queen's Park. We are an inclusive and diverse community of people who seek to confidently share the love of Christ . The Church you will remember from your School Days sadly had a number of structural issues and during the 1990's a decision was made to redevelop the site.

An Ecumenical Agreement was reached between the local United Reformed Church (St Andrew's), who also had a large building in the street beside the library, that we would build a shared modern church together on the old St Anne's Site. In addition, the congregations agreed to design the building in a way that they would develop and host jointly London Inter Faith Centre. This Centre aimed to be a Christian hosted Centre for those of all faiths and none, to learn about each other. The new building was opened on the 20th May 1998.

We hope you enjoy your visit with us today.

Historical Note

Kilburn Grammar School was founded by the Reverend Dr Bonavia Hunt, the Vicar of St Paul's Kilburn, in 1897 and occupied a site in Salusbury Road next to St Anne's Church from 1900. school's new "Speech Hall" was opened by Bishop Mandell Creighton in July 1900. the death of Bishop Creighton later that year, permission was given by his widow to call the hall "Creighton Hall". Speech night in 1902 saw the unveiling of a memorial window in the Hall to Bishop Mandell Creighton by his successor, Bishop Winnington Ingram. F-Ingram, Bishop of London, at Speech nights in 1902, 1915 and 1937. He also dedicated the war memorial that was unveiled in the Creighton Hall on 5 December 1922. school continued to exist as a grammar school until 1967, when it became Kilburn Senior High School following the introduction of comprehensive schools throughout the London Borough of Brent. Borough subsequently closed the school and sold the site and since 1989 the buildings have been occupied by the Islamia Primary School and the Islamia Girl's Secondary School.

The Old Boys Association was formed in 1919 and, although the last intake to the grammar school was in 1965, it still has a membership of around 400. Members range in age from 63 to 95.
